CARS ON THE ROAD INCREASING

The number of cars on England's roads rose to 25.8m in the third quarter of 2015, a year-on-year increase of almost 600,000. Since 2011, the number of cars has increased by about 1.6m in England, 142,000 in Scotland and 69,000 in Wales. The largest rise has been in south-east England, with 373,200 more cars over the five year period, while in terms of overall numbers the East of England (3.3m) has moved ahead of the North West (3.2m). The figures correlate with a rise in new car production.

The 2014 National Travel Survey confirmed that the car dominates UK travel, accounting for 64% of all journeys made and 78% of the distance travelled each year by an individual



LOCAL AUTHORITIES PAY OUT COMPENSATION

New research from the TaxPayers' Alliance (TPA) has shown that, across Great Britain over the last two years, over £100m has been paid out in compensation claims against local authorities. Of the £100m, nearly eight million was paid out in claims related to potholes over 2013-2014 and 2014-2015. The figures indicate that some local authorities are failing to adequately deliver services – such as pothole repair and road maintenance – resulting in costly compensation claims. Other claims can be attributed to failure to meet the legal standard of care required of local authorities.

Chief executive of the TaxPayers' Alliance, Jonathan Isaby, commented: "The compensation culture is costing taxpayers dear and every pound spent on settlements or higher insurance premiums is a pound that isn't spent on essential services such as road maintenance or social care."

In just the last month or so, volunteers have been seen helping residents in Hellingly, East Sussex to protect their properties with sandbags during the recent flooding, and rescuing drivers from cars that have driven through flood waters.

The incidence of reported whiplash injuries has risen dramatically in the UK and other western countries since 1980's. In the mid 80's reported annual incidents in the UK were in the hundreds. In 2002 the annual estimated incidence had arisen to 250,000



What is whiplash?

Common injury that occurs to a person's neck following a sudden accelerationdeceleration forces that cause unrestrained rapid forward and backward movement of the head and neck.

Symptoms of Whiplash.

Majority of whiplashes involve muscles, ligaments, tendons, joint capsules and nerves. Listed below are some of the most common symptoms reported by patients.

Neck pain and Stiffness Shoulder pain and Stiffness Jaw Pain Visual Disturbance Tinnitus Fatigue Dizziness Arm Pain and Weakness Headache

80% OF TRAFFIC LIGHTS SHOULD BE REMOVED

THE INSTITUTE OF ECONOMIC AFFAIRS (IEA)

New reports published by the IEA claims that this would boost the economy and improve road safety. The think tank says the high proportion of traffic regulation is not only detrimental to road safety, the economy and the environment, but that it also imposes huge costs on road-users, taxpayers and communities.

From 2000 to 2014, when there was little growth in traffic volumes, the number of traffic lights on Britain's roads increased by 25%. The number of junctions controlled by signals has risen to about 15,000 with a further 18,000 pedestrian crossings. The number of instructional traffic signs in England reached 4.57 million in 2013 – an increase of 112% since 1993. The report also looks at other areas of driver control including speed cameras saying that, after Britain's first speed was installed in 1992, within 20 years there were more than 3,000 at 2,300 fixed sites and that monitoring now extends to large sections of the motorway network, a step change in the surveillance of motorists.

The IEA report discusses the proliferation in 20mph zones, saying that in 2013 Islington became the first borough to bring in a blanket 20mph speed limit, and by summer 2015 around 14 million people lived in local authorities that had adopted or were in the process of adopting a 20mph standard. It also looks at the effect of bus lanes on traffic. The importance of the road network means the cumulative effect of these measures imposes an enormous burden on the UK economy, says the report's summary. Just a two-minute delay to every car trip equates to a loss of approximately £16 billion a year. It wants most traffic lights to be replaced by filter-in-turn or all-way give-ways. Many bus lanes, cycle lanes, speed cameras and parking restrictions should also go. Culling such traffic management infrastructure would deliver substantial economic and social benefits the report suggests.
