KENT SURREY SUSSEX AIR AMBULANCE -31 JANUARY 2013



This scene was one of many such incidents attended by the Kent Surrey Sussex Air Ambulance who are called out to assist in the event of a serious "life threatening" or "life changing" injury.

On 31 January our speaker Richard Draycott gave us a fascinating insight into the work of the air ambulance service, which currently operates a day-light emergency service from two locations - Mardon in Kent and Redhill in Surrey. The service covers an area in excess of 3,500 square miles with a resident population of 4.5 million and a transient population in excess of 90 million per year. These aircraft are capable of reaching any location in under 20 minutes flying time.

Each aircraft is crewed by an experienced Pilot and an Enhanced Care Team consisting of a senior Doctor and a Critical Care Paramedic, enabling them to provide a range of advanced treatments including delivering emergency anaesthetics and surgical interventions, up to and including open chest surgery! This service will soon be expanded to take in night flying, providing a further boost to emergency care. Check out their website: http://www.kssairambulance.org.uk/

TRAINING OFFICER'S REPORT

GREEN LIGHT FOR DRIVING TESTS AT HALFORD

Stephen Hammond, road safety minister, has given the go ahead to plans to offer the practical driving test from branches of Halfords.

Driving tests will be available from the Halfords store in Wellingborough from 5 February, with other branches across the country expected to start offering tests in the coming months. All tests will be conducted by Driving Standards Agency (DSA) examiners.

The move is part of an initiative to offer a more local service for driving test candidates. As well as using conventional test centres, DSA is working with public and private sector partners to provide driving tests in areas that don't have a local test centre.

COCK-PIT CHECKS - for use on RoSPA Driving Test

Prior to getting into the vehicle today I have carried out a full POWDER check of my vehicle. (The examiner may ask you to explain parts of this. If they do not ask, **<u>do not</u>** go into detail.)

I am driving a (e.g. BMW 320i), motor car, which is driven through the Front/Rear wheels, via a 5/6 speed / automatic gear box – whatever is appropriate for the vehicle you are driving!

I am familiar with all the controls and instruments they are all adjusted to my satisfaction.

Check foot brake for firm pressure. (Static brake check)

Switching on the ignition, I see a bank of warning lights, showing there is an electrical circuit. I am depressing the clutch. I will keep my left/right hand (as appropriate) on the steering wheel to check the power steering function as I start the engine.

All relevant warning lights have now gone out. I expect the handbrake warning light to go out when it is released. I have put my seatbelt on, can I ask passengers to check that their seatbelts and head restraint are adjusted correctly.

Engaging gear, checking mirrors and blind spots, when safe I will move off.

Once on the move carry out a rolling brake check.

Candidates should be able to answer questions in relation to POWDER checks they have carried out. They should also be able to answer questions on Roadcraft and the Highway Code.

LAW ON DRIVING LICENCE EXCHANGE TIGHTENED TO IMPROVE ROAD SAFETY

Foreign drivers must prove they have passed an appropriate driving test before getting a British licence under tough new rules announced by Road Safety Minister Stephen Hammond.

An inconsistency in the law meant that previously some non EU drivers were able to exchange their licence without proving that the necessary standards to drive in this country had been met.

The change in law means requests to exchange driving licences from outside the EU will only be accepted if the licence holder can prove they passed a driving test in a country where the testing standards are comparable with those in Britain.

The change in law came into force on 11 January 2013.

PHOTOCARD LICENCE

A warning has been given that if your photo is out of date on your driving licence you will not be allowed to participate in any of the National Driver Rectification Programmes.

ROAD FUND LICENCE DISC

Discussions are taking place which could mean the end of a tax disc – not may I say the end of paying the duty however. Watch out for further information in the coming months.

STATISTICAL BANTER

Porsche drivers are statistically the most likely to be caught speeding, with more than 14% having a conviction, according to MoneySupermarket.com. The data, from the latest MoneySupermarket Motor Monitor which is based on convictions indicated when retrieving car insurance quotes, is based on more than 14 million car insurance quotes, reveals that Aston Martin (14.1%) and Jaguar (13%) drivers are the next most likely to have speeding convictions. Conversely, at 4.6% Morris drivers are least likely to have a conviction, followed by Daihatsu (5.8%), and Proton (6%).

Looking at the data by location reveals that people living in Bournemouth are the most frequent speeders, with 12.3% having convictions. People living in London (5%) are the least likely. In terms of occupation, operations directors (23.1%) are the most likely speeders. At 23% and 21.1% respectively, surgeons and sales directors are the next most likely to have speeding convictions. On the other hand, at 3.2% warehousemen are least likely to have a speeding conviction – closely followed by driving instructors (3.3%) and casual workers (3.4%).
